FLUSH IT OUT

Flushing program continues in June

Whether it's emergency crews at a hydrant or a resident in their kitchen, everyone expects clean water to flow when they flip the switch.

The Township's flushing program is an annual maintenance operation aimed at keeping the water system flowing free and clear. Discolored water and pressure fluctuations are normal during flushing. Try to avoid using water or doing laundry during this time.

If, in a reasonable time, your water does not clear, return to normal pressure, or service is interrupted, call Customer Service, 724-776-4806 and use extension 1600 during working hours or 1550 after hours.

The remainder of the flushing schedule is as follows:

WEEK 8 – JUNE 1:

Woodlands Townhouses, Swift Homes, Woodlands Houses, Clearbrook, Cranberry

Estates, Ashford Manor, Cranberry Pointe, Cranberry West, Kimberwicke, Harvest Drive, Holiday Drive, Powell Road from Rochester Road to Blue Ridge Drive, Creekwood Commons, Creekwood & Freedom Woods.

WEEK 9 – JUNE 8:

Forest Park, The Crossings, Mystic Pine Trail, Blue Ridge Estates, Berkley Manor, Hampshire Woods, Autumn Hill, Orchard Park & The Glen at Woodside.

WEEK 10 – JUNE 15:

Powell Road between Rochester Road and Glen Eden Road, Park Place, Chatham Commons, Highland Village, Havenwood, Hunters Creek, Stonefield & Farmview, Greenfield Estates, Avery's Field, Woodbine Estates, The Links of Cranberry, Eden Square Apartments, St. Killian's Parish School, North Catholic High School, The Haven at Cranberry Woods, The Village at Cranberry Woods & Meeder.

Right-of-way clearing makes work easier


They may not be on ATVs, but the Township's Utilities Department crews will be doing a little off-roading in the coming weeks.

Many of the Township's sanitary sewer and waterline right-of-ways are not in open areas, instead located off the beaten path. That's why crews will begin clearing those right-of-ways with brush hawks, making

multiple passes to knock down heavy debris and weeds.

The goal is to keep those areas clear in the event of a clog, break or other issues arise. With crews not needing to worry about access to the area, they can more quickly and efficiently address the problem.

It will keep workers, as well as the pipes, moving free and clear.

Hydrant painting to take place

Though what's inside fire hydrants is perhaps most important, being able to find them in an emergency is just as crucial.

Utilities Department crews will be painting and refreshing hydrants beginning in June, with work continuing through August. By making sure hydrants are a uniform color, emergency crews can more quickly locate them during an emergency. Residents can also do their part in making hydrants easily found by keeping them clear of shrubs, trees and landscaping. This includes two feet behind the hydrant and five feet on each side. Nothing should be planted between the hydrant and street.




